

The most dramatic shift in the geographical center of Christianity in the world that has ever happened in history.



The Big Global Picture

Christianity's statistical center of gravity by 2010 had moved to a point near Timbuktu, in Mali.

Europe and North
America—the global
"North"—contained 80%
of all Christians in 1910,
and only 40% a century
later.

By 1980, more Christians were living in the global South than the global North for the first time in 1000 years.

Christianity's Growth in Africa

- In 1900, 2% of the world's Christians lived in Africa
- Today, one out of four Christians is an African
- Lagos—one of ten buildings church
- Christianity grew by 50 million last year in this continent
- By 2025, in just 7 years from now, 40% of the world's Christians will be African



Christianity's Growth in Latin America

- The overall Christian population in Latin America was 550 million in 2010.
- It is projected to be at 640 million by 2025, about the same number as Christians in Africa.
- Non-Catholic expressions of Christianity are growing at three times the rate of Catholic growth.
- 80% to 90% of Protestant growth in Latin America comes from Pentecostals.



Christianity's Growth in Asia

- Christian population in Asia is about 350 million people.
- This will grow to 460 million by 2025.
- In the past century Christianity grew at twice the rate of population growth.
- Visit toMalaysia, 9% Christian and Korea, 30%; Myungsung Presby. Church





- Christianity has become a Non-Western Religion.
- The Future of Christianity is moving out of the Western and largely White Culture which has been its home for the past 400 years.
- Christianity is growing in non-Western, non-White cultures.
- These changes are reflected back to U.S. congregations through immigration and global inter-relationships.

Facing U.S.
Congregations

About 350,000 congregations in the U.S.

30%-40% of congregations could close in the next 25 years.

In 2015, over half (57%) were under 100 in size

Only one in ten congregations reflects that demographic reality.

Average attendance dropped from 105 to 80

In general population, 20% is between ages of 18-34.

2. Embracing the Color of the Future



People of Color are Providing Growth in U.S. Churches

From 1991 to 2014 White Protestants have declined by one-third.



Only 28% of white millennials identify of Christian believers.



Multiracial congregations have grown; dealing one in five Americans now belong to a multiracial church.



Most growth in evangelical, Catholic,
Pentecostal, and mainline denominations is driven by people of color



Immigration is a major contributor to congregational growth



Multiracial congregations are more likely to grow than white congregations and show higher levels of spiritual vitality.




Overcoming the Great Divide
