My husband and I are the biological, foster, adopted and loved in parents to 21 children. We have 5 grandchildren and one due next month.

My husband and I have successfully planted two churches and most recently merged two churches. I am energized by the opportunity to walk alongside Pastors to grow their churches, spiritually, physically and financially. I believe Matthew 9:37, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few." Gods' word is true, the church is not dying it is repositioning and the Bishop and synod staff are imperative during this season of change.
