


Tuesday Workshop Summaries

Lutheran Identity in Changing Times - Rev. Dr. H Ashley Hall

Workshop Description: Both workshops with Rev. Dr. H. Ashley Hall will allow participants to discuss and wrestle with the enduring struggle of faithful ministry: how shall we proclaim the enduring good news of Jesus Christ in an ever-changing world? We will acknowledge the essential character of Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions as normative guides for our theological perspective while also noting that, at times, the best way to be faithful to both Scripture and the Confessions may lead to "breaking" with a prior tradition of interpretation. We will sit with and discuss how the options to "keep the tradition/traditional interpretations of Scripture" and "change in the name of faithfulness" are not always so clear (at least, not always in the moment). To inform the kind of questions the Church wrestles with today, we'll use a document from the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) that suggests key components of "Lutheran Identity." The morning section will focus on "Lutheran identity" in light of how the first generations of Lutheran theologians and pastors thought about Scripture and Tradition; the afternoon section will focus on "Lutheran identity" in light of the fairly modern idea that doctrines "develop" over time. Our hope is that participants come away with both the assurance that they're not the first to wrestle with these questions and be equipped with some theological and historical perspectives to better engage with the world today.

Advanced Preparation: Please read the attached document prior to the workshop. Participants may find it helpful to skim through a set of theses on "Lutheran Identity" written by Theo Dieter and the staff of the LWF's ecumenical research center in Strasbourg. Faith Partners - Rev. Otto Schultz

Workshop Description: Faith Partners helps churches develop a team approach to alcohol, drug and mental health issues. There is a proper role for churches to play in education, reducing stigma, and in supporting family recovery. Most churches have an underused resource in members who have had personal or professional success in dealing with these issues. Many of them would like their church to get involved, but they don't have the means to make that involvement happen. Faith Partners provides the training and support to help them become an effective team addressing these issues. Join us and explore how you can put this model to work in your church.

Presenter Bio: Otto B Schultz is a retired LADC (Licensed Alcohol and Drug Counselor) who holds B. A. and Master of Divinity Degrees. He is also a (mostly) retired Lutheran Pastor. He has been in alcohol/drug field for over 45 years as a chaplain, counselor, educator and program developer. He has led hundreds of workshops on practical ways to deal with alcohol and drug problems. He is currently the Developer of Faith Partners program helping faith congregations take a team approach to alcohol/drug and mental health issues. He is also working with a team to develop restorative approaches for clergy whose work has been impaired by alcohol, drug and mental health issues. Pastor Schultz has two children, Matthew Stahl of Caro, Michigan and Leighun Brabec of Lincoln.



Overcoming Obstacles and Allergies to Self-Care - David Pinkston

Workshop Description: "Local, sustainable" is a phrase often heard in various 'organic' marketplaces. One may interpret this to mean that long-term care has gone into the product being offered. It can also symbolize (say, in an agrarian sense) an alternate form of provision and care for the earth as the earth provides and cares for us. Spiritual direction is one of the few mediums by which we receive undivided attention with spiritual and emotional care. In ministry work, our eyes are intently focused outward, finding ways to care for others. This is important! So, spiritual direction, in this sense, is a local and sustainable way of tending to and caring for leadership in the church as they tend to and care for others!

Spiritual direction is also an art-form that is misunderstood and underutilized for those in ministry. This workshop will clarify and demystify what spiritual direction is and what it is not. Join us as spiritual directors from Seeking the Spirit Within offer their experience of giving and receiving spiritual direction, and how it has impacted the sustainability of their call.

Presenter Bio: David Pinkston pastored a church in Pasadena, CA for nearly 30 years. He and his wife were missionally engaged in various social justice movements throughout the LA area. He has been practicing contemplative in the Jesus Path for 20 years. He graduated from Portland Seminary at George Fox University (MASF). In 2015, he received training as a spiritual director through the School of Sustainable Faith and focuses his spiritual direction practice on clergy care. He currently serves as program director of Seeking the Spirit Within.
