Go and... Be Present A Worship Guide for Mid-week Worship for Advent 2023

Instructions, Ideas, and Advice:

This worship resource is meant to be a useful starting place for your congregational context to continue to engage the Nebraska Synod's "Go And..." focus for the 2023-2024 ministry year. It is meant to be adapted by your congregation in a way that makes it fit well with your context.

The guide includes worship plans for three mid-week services, and an optional fourth service which could be utilized around the theme as a "Longest Night" and/or "Blue Christmas" worship service. If your congregation chooses to use such a service on the last Wednesday before Christmas, this year being Wednesday December 20th, it may make sense to begin this mid-week series then on Wednesday November 29th (the Wednesday prior to the First Sunday of Advent). As this is an adaptable resource, utilize this in a way that makes most sense for your context.

In terms of the worship order, the three mid-week services are offered with suggested hymn or music ideas and some spoken liturgy. These hymn suggestions are largely from the hymnals *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* and *All Creation* Sings, though many of the hymns suggested are also available in either *The Lutheran Book of Worship* or *With One Voice*. An additional amended version of the orders of service are offered on pages 18-23, to incorporate the sung liturgy of Marty Haugen's *Holden Evening Prayer*.

Theme and Suggested Scripture Focus:

The "Go And..." focus for the Nebraska Synod journey for December 2023 is "Go And...Be Present." To dig into this theme, this resource breaks it into three focus areas:

Week 1: Go and Be Present and Pause

Week 2: Go and Be Present with Tradition

Week 3: Go and Be Present while you are on the Go

The idea behind this is to invite disciples and congregations to pause and breathe deeply during what can be a busy time of year. That's particularly the focus of Week 1. Week 2 offers an opportunity to surface some of the meaningful traditions that disciples engage in this time of the year, and to reflect on them intentionally. Not to give up any meaningful ones, but perhaps to lean in with more presence into the practices and traditions that are meaningful and give permission to give up some of the less meaningful ones. Finally, Week 3 names the reality that for many people, this time of the year may be one spent being on the Go. Even so, we're still called to be present. What might this look and feel like?

To wonder about these questions, this resource suggests <u>ONE</u> scripture reading each week. For the three midweek orders of service preceding a possible Longest Night service, it is suggested that God's people go and be present with the familiar but sometimes rushed through and overlooked stories of Luke 1. So often it might feel like we rush to the Nativity story in Luke 2 on Christmas Eve, without setting the stage because the lectionary for Sundays takes us way ahead in the story (Advent 1) back to John the Baptist (Advent 2 and/or 3), and may or may not leave room to hear the stories of Mary, Elizabeth, and Zechariah which set the stage for the Nativity Story so well. So, this year with this mid-week resource, we invite the congregations of the synod to dig in a bit deeper as we journey together during the weeks of Advent to the stories of Luke 1. The suggested scripture reading flow is as follows:

Week 1: Luke 1:1-25: Dedication to Theophilus & The Birth of John the Baptist Foretold

Week 2: Luke 1:26-56: The Birth of Jesus Foretold, Mary's Visit to Elizabeth, & Mary's Song of Praise

Week 3: Luke 1:57-80: The Birth of John the Baptist & Zechariah's Prophecy

By reading all eighty verses over three weeks this would obviously set the stage then for the Christmas Eve gospel reading to begin at Luke 2:1. It would hopefully create some time to be present with the story and to engage it with new ways.

Reflections, Preaching, Story Sharing and Conversation

To accompany the readings and the theme, there are three weekly suggested reflection questions that follow each scripture passage in the worship order. These questions could be printed for reflection or placed on slides for all to see. They could be used as preaching points for the preacher to approach the story for the evening and then invite reflection on the "Go and Be Present" theme amid the progression through the Advent season. They could be used as conversation starters over a meal prior to or after the evening worship. They could simply be questions that are left for discussion within the worship space, or to be contemplated and then shared as story starters during the offering time in worship perhaps. Or they could serve as the starter for a 3-5 minute homily type reflection, which could then be followed up by 3-5 minutes of conversation time in small groups in the worship space. The possibilities are endless. Again, do whatever makes the most sense for your ministry context.

Additional Notes:

The Advent Wreath litany comes from the text of the hymn, "As the Dark Awaits the Dawn," (ELW 261) by Susan Palo Cherwien. The text invites one to be grounded and present, while also focusing on the light of Christ to come. This litany than would lead into the lighting of the wreath and the beginning of the singing of a hymn or the *Holden Evening Prayer* liturgy. There are additional prayers throughout this guide built around the theme, including spoken prayers of the people which can be utilized as desired. (Note that among those prayers, the third petition is tweaked slightly from week to week to better acknowledge to particular theme focus for the evening.)

Call to Worship - based on John 1

P: In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.

Welcome and Opening Litany

P: Christmas always seems to be accompanied by jolly songs, ringing bells, and the expectation that you will have a good time. But that's not how it feels for many people. Maybe your year has been hard, and Christmas seems to highlight the difficulties. Or maybe in an overly busy life, you just want space to pause and be present- to reflect, recall, and regroup. Wherever you find yourself, we meet in the name of a loving God,

All: Who knows our needs, hears our cries, and heals our wounds.

P: The people that walked in darkness have seen a great light.

We light the Christ candle as a sign that when all seems dark, there is still light.

Candle is lit

P: Come God-for-us: Who whispers in our ears that each of us are beloved children.

Come God-under-us: Who cradles us in arms that never grow weary; whose lap has room for all.

Come, God-with-us: Who braves our rejection and hurt, who holds us in acceptance and love.

Come, God-over-us: Who watches in the long silence of the night, that we might rest in peace.

Come, God-beside-us: Who steadies us when we falter, who lifts us up when we fall.

Come, God behind us: Who picks up all the faded dreams we drop along the way, and patchworks them into hope.

O come, O come, Immanuel:

C: And help us again rejoice.

Assurance of God's Love and Acceptance

Hearing the Word of God for our time, our place

P: As we listen to the Word, we'll pause and light one of the Advent Wreath candles after each reading, and then share a short prayer before proceeding to the next reading.

First Reading: The Gospel of Luke 6:17-23

P: This familiar passage reveals that Jesus was well aware of people's sorrows, yearnings, and suffering, and offered a promise of something different.

He came down with them and stood on a level place, with a great crowd of his disciples and a great multitude of people from all Judea, Jerusalem, and the coast of Tyre and Sidon. They had come to hear him and to be healed of their diseases; and those who were troubled with unclean spirits were cured. And all in the crowd were trying to touch him, for power came out from him and healed all of them. Then he looked up at his disciples and said: "Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God. "Blessed are you who are hungry now, for you will be filled. "Blessed are you who weep now, for you will laugh. Blessed are you when people hate you, and when they exclude you, revile you, and defame you on account of the Son of Man. Rejoice in that day and leap for joy, for surely your reward is great in heaven; for that is what their ancestors did to the prophets.

The first candle may be lit

P: Lord Jesus,

C: like this candle, bring warmth and light to those who mourn, who hunger and thirst, and who weep.

Second Reading: Psalm 22:1-11

P: Even Jesus knew the feeling of being abandoned by God, the God whom he had believed in, and of being left alone in his darkness.

My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from helping me, from the words of my groaning? O my God, I cry by day, but you do not answer; and by night, but find no rest. Yet you are holy, enthroned on the praises of Israel. In you our ancestors trusted; they trusted, and you delivered them. To you they cried, and were saved; in you they trusted, and were not put to shame. But I am a worm, and not human; scorned by others, and despised by the people. All who see me mock at me; they make mouths at me, they shake their heads; "Commit your cause to the LORD; let him deliver — let him rescue the one in

whom he delights!" Yet it was you who took me from the womb; you kept me safe on my mother's breast. On you I was cast from my birth, and since my mother bore me you have been my God. Do not be far from me, for trouble is near and there is no one to help.

The second candle may be lit

P: Spirit of God,

C: shine like this candle in the darkness, lighting the way for all who feel abandoned, hurt, forsaken, and forgotten.

Third Reading: The Gospel of Matthew 11:28-29

P: When burdens get piled on top of other burdens, or the rush of the seasons seems too great and gets in the way of our ability to be present, the load can seem too much. In his promise, Jesus offers us help to carry our burdens and responsibilities.

Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls.

The third candle may be lit

P: Friend Jesus,

C: we don't ask you to shoulder our burdens for us, just help us carry a corner of them, and we can carry on.

Fourth Reading: Revelation 7:15-17

P: Our present world is not how God wants things to be. Those who weep now will not weep later. In the new heaven and new earth, there will be no more need for tears.

For this reason they are before the throne of God, and worship him day and night within his temple, and the one who is seated on the throne will shelter them. They will hunger no more, and thirst no more; the sun will not strike them, nor any scorching heat; for the Lamb at the center of the throne will be their shepherd, and he will guide them to springs the water of life, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes."

The fourth candle may be lit

P: Lord God,

C: your vision seems a long way in the future. Bring your promise closer to us, we pray. Amen.

Holy One, the beginning and the end, the giver of life: blessed are you for the birth of creation. Blessed are you in the darkness that is long on nights like this, and in the light of the day to come. Blessed are you for the memories we have, and the days ahead which you walk with us through. Blessed are you in the prophets' hopes and dreams. Blessed are you for your Son Jesus, the Word made flesh.

In the night in which he was handed over, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me. Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Let us proclaim the mystery of faith.

P: Holy God, we long for your Spirit. Come among us. Bless this meal. May your Word take flesh in us. Awaken your people. Fill us with your light. Bring the gift of peace on earth.
