13th is a 2016 American documentary film that explores the intersection of race, justice, and mass incarceration in the United States. It is titled after the Thirteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution, adopted in 1865, which abolished slavery throughout the United States and ended involuntary servitude except as a punishment for conviction of a crime.

Troy Maxson once dreamed of becoming a professional baseball player, but was deemed too old when the major leagues began admitting Black athletes. Now he makes his living as a sanitation worker in 1950s Pittsburgh. Bitter over his missed opportunity, Troy creates further tension in his family when he squashes his son's chance to meet a college football recruiter.

Fruitvale Station [trailer]

The film depicts the story of Oscar Grant III, a 22-year-old from Hayward, California, and his experiences on the last day of his life, before he was fatally shot by BART Police in the early morning hours of New Year's Day 2009.
