FACTS ABOUT TORNADOES



Often words are used to describe the type of tornadoes and associated weather conditions. Below is a glossary that can help to explain these words to children.

WHAT DOES IT MEAN WHEN THERE IS A **TORNADO WATCH?**

A tornado watch is when the weather indicates the possibility of wind conditions becoming a tornado.

TYPES OF TORNADOS

- Rope Tornado: This is the most common type of tornado. They are called this because rope tornadoes look just like a rope, long and thin. Most tornadoes start and end as a rope tornado.
- Cone Tornado: Cone tornadoes look like a cone. They are wide at the bottom but even wider towards the top where the tornado meets the thunderstorm.
- Wedge Tornado: Wedge tornadoes are wider than they are long.

WEATHER WORDS

- Funnel Clouds: Funnel clouds look like a tornado but they never touch the ground.
- Microbursts: Microbursts are air that is pushing down creating one funnel. They are smaller and last shorter than tornadoes but are just as dangerous.
- Tornado Alley: Tornado alley is the name given to parts of the US where tornadoes most likely happen.
- Water Spout: A water spout is a funnel that occurs over water.
