# A Musical Reflection

I absolutely love the hymn "I Love to Tell the Story". I remember learning the words and singing it in Sunday School and later singing it in church and seeing the absolute truth of the words of the hymn being reflected on those around me singing the hymn. There were faces of all ages, some with eyes uplifted, some quietly humming with their eyes closed swaying to the music, some singing jubilantly, some singing incredible four-part harmony and others singing blissfully unaware of being off key but so full of joy and love for the story. It was such powerful and incredible witness to be surrounded by so many who loved to tell the story. Even as a kid, I just knew it had to be a story worth knowing and worth telling.

This words to this hymn were written by Arabella Katherine Hankey as a two-stanza poem published in 1866. She was the daughter of a wealthy English banker who taught Sunday School as a teenager and later became a missionary nurse in South Africa. She wrote the words as the part of a 50-stanza poem. The first part was called "The Story Wanted" and the second part "The Story Told".

Wow! As a woman in the 1800's, she must have felt a very strong pull to tell the story if she was willing to be both a missionary nurse and a poet. Not only that, but she also wrote the story while she was very sick. Personally, I might have spent my time being angry at God and wondering why I was sick. Instead, she felt compelled to share the story. For me, knowing the history behind these words gives them even more power. I pray that in our own ways, we might all feel so strongly compelled to tell the story.

I have found several different versions of the old hymn. Although they are the same melody and the same words, each one tells the story uniquely. As you listen to them, and watch the videos, I hope it helps you to find YOUR voice to tell the story. There are NO wrong answers!
