Cultivating Love through Lent With Call, Response and Conversation A Lenten Journey for the Nebraska Synod for Lent 2025

As we prepare for our Lenten Journeys to come, the Nebraska Synod walks together cultivating love. One of those ways that we can do this, is through a shared Lenten experience.

Overview of this Resource

During the 2024-2025 ministry year, the Nebraska Synod is committed to ministry together under the theme of Cultivating Love. During the bulk of Lent, in the month of March, there will be a particular focus on "Cultivating Love through Response." This theme is central in this Cultivating Love resource offering for the Lenten season.

To help practice "Cultivating Love through Response," this Lenten resource is designed to be a "Call and Response and Conversation." There are questions for reflection, and space for story sharing. Any of the questions could shape or inform a faith story or homiletic reflection, if desired.

This resource provides a basic structure for mid-week worship under this theme, with suggested scriptures, hymns, and discussion questions based on the scriptures and themes. Within this document are full outlines for all five weeks. These are meant to be adapted and adjusted based on your context and are easily adaptable for your preferred bulletin or slide structure. For congregations who prefer a single 8.5x11" sheet of paper for a bulletin, also provided on the Nebraska Synod website are basic service outlines for each week.

Notes, Suggestions and Things to Consider

Space Considerations

Call, Response and Conversation requires that worshipers can talk with one another either one on one or in small groups. Consider what space will be most conducive to that. It may be the sanctuary, where worshipers can be invited to move closer to one another during the time for conversation. Or it may be a different space like a fellowship hall, where seats can be arranged around tables or in circles. Think about where people will hear each other best and how music can be included in that space. Consider too if this opportunity will be for in-person only participants, online only participants, or a hybrid of both, and be intentional about how you will engage the whole faith community as a part of this experience.

Storytellers

There is a time within each midweek worship service for God's people to share their call stories. Many of these stories will come from the prior conversation, or be based on one (or more) of the conversation questions. Anyone can tell a story of how they have responded to God's call with their hands, voice, time, talents, or courage. However, if sharing stories extemporaneously is something that has not been done often within your context, you may choose to line up a speaker for each week, giving them time to prepare. Another possibility is lining up a speaker for the first week or two instead of all five, so that worshipers have a chance to hear an example before they volunteer their own stories.

To engage the whole congregation, it would be ideal to include voices from across the congregation in sharing stories. However, if the time or feeling of this does not seem to resonate for your context, this space could be alternatively used for further reflection on one or more of the conversation questions for the evening, perhaps in the form of a brief homily.

Marking Our Way to the Cross

A visual representation of the Lenten journey can either be added to the worship space or sent home with worshipers each week. Here are some ideas of simple ways to represent each week:

Week 1 *We respond with our hands.*

Either trace hands on colorful paper and cut out or stamp handprints.

Week 2 We respond with our voices.

Sound is harder to represent visually, but old CDs or sheet music could be used.

Week 3 *We respond with time.*

Make clock faces with paper plates and brads or use calendar pages.

Week 4 *We respond with talents.*

We often refer to talents as gifts. Use wrapping paper and ribbon. Certain gifts are also included in the readings, so scraps of wood or fabric could also be used.

Week 5 *What is holding us back?*

We talk about hurdles this week. Create some hurdles from any materials. Or, to represent that God provides us with what we need, use arrows, green lights, or something else to represent that we have the go ahead.

These are just starting points. They may spark bigger and better ideas. Do what works in your context, although it may surprise you which adults are interested in creating when given an opportunity and direction.

Music and Hymn Suggestions

Within the worship outline, there is no mention of prelude or postlude. Depending on your context, both could be included prior to and following worship. Alternatively, if your context will be serving a meal prior to or following worship, consider how the service experience will flow out of or into the meal space. That may inform what kind of musical feel and experience you may want to include and incorporate.

Each week's service includes three hymn spaces within the worship order. You may observe and adapt them as helpful. The call to worship or opening hymn suggestion from week to week is the same, creating the potential of a regular entry point to the service throughout the Lenten Journey. The same is true for the closing or sending hymn. The suggested hymn of the day varies from week to week, based on the theme focus and scripture readings. Of note, each hymn space within the worship order includes at least one suggestion from both the ELW (*Evangelical Lutheran Worship*), and the LBW (*Lutheran Book of Worship*), which should make these hymn choices accessible for the entire Nebraska Synod. Additionally, there are also possible hymn suggestions from the ACS (*All Creation Sings*), and WOV (*With One Voice*) hymnals.

During the hymn of the day, we will respond to God with our gifts of song and offering. This would be the appropriate space each week to receive an offering during the worship order.

Other Worship Notes

Many congregations of the Nebraska Synod like to include a healing service during the Lenten season. To assist with this, an optional healing service has been included within the order for the Fifth and final Wednesday of this series. It is included within the worship order for that day as an option during the prayers section.

Graphics

Graphics which can be included within the worship space and on your congregation's bulletins or slides, and in promotion of this Lenten journey will be added to the synod website soon. These graphics can be used in a number of ways:

- 1) Use for publicity of midweek worship services.
- 2) Add to bulletins or slides for added interest.
- 3) Instead of creating something each week as suggested in <u>Marking Our Way to the Cross</u>, either add a graphic to the worship space or send a graphic home with worshipers each week.

No hymn texts or melodies are included in this resource, but the hymns are noted with their numbers and hymnals that they can be found in. God Calls God's People in Scripture

¹³But Moses said to God, "If I come to the Israelites and say to them, 'The God of your ancestors has sent me to you.' and they ask me, 'What is his name?' What shall I say to them?" ¹⁴God said to Moses, "I Am who I Am." [God] said further, "Thus you shall say to the Israelites, 'The Lord, the God of your ancestors, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, the God of Jacob, has sent me to you. This is my name forever, and this my title for all generations."

4 Then Moses answered, "But suppose they do not believe me or listen to me, but say, 'The LORD did not appear to you." ²The LORD said to him, "What is that in your hand?" He said, "A staff." ³And [God] said, "Throw it on the ground." So he threw the staff on the ground, and it became a snake; and Moses drew back from it. ⁴Then the LORD said to Moses, "Reach out your hand, and seize it by the

tail" – so he reached out his hand and grasped it, and it became a staff in his hand – 5"so that they may believe that the LORD, the God of their ancestors, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, has appeared to you."

John 6:1-11

6 After this Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. ²A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. ³Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. ⁴Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. ⁵When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" ⁶He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. ⁷Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." ⁸One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, ⁹"There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" ¹⁰Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. ¹¹then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted.

Questions for Reflection, Conversation, and Stories

- If you were to put Moses' response to God's call in one-word, what word would that be?
- God asks Moses, "What is that in your hand?" What is in his hand and how is it used?
- In the reading from John, Jesus uses what is at hand. Think of a time that you have used either what was in your hand or at hand to respond to God's call. How were God's people served? How did it feel to know you did not have to buy more or be more? How did you know you had and were enough?

L: We pray for all those in your care. Strengthen those who use their hands in the art of caretaking. Embrace all those in need of healing. We pray especially for . . . Hear us, O God. **C: YOUR MERCY IS GREAT.**

- Jeremiah tells God he doesn't know how to speak. Many people are afraid of public speaking. What other ways are there to raise one's voice?
- Think about a time when you used your voice in some way to lift up a person or a cause. Did you feel you had the "right" words? Did God put words in your mouth? How was the person or the cause affected? How were you affected?

- Where in your day or week do you take time to listen to God?
- When you have responded to God with time, what has that time meant to you? How has that time then extended to time with others?
- Ephesians speaks of "singing and making melody in your hearts." How do you see us making melody with our lives?
- How do you see us harmonizing with others?

We thank you especially for those who have given of themselves and their time in sharing their stories of responding to your call. Hear us, O God.

We have thought of your creation as lasting forever, but as we see fossil fuels being depleted, land eroding, oceans filling with pollution, and species becoming extinct, we are ever more mindful of limits. 22 ⁶Then [David] called for his son Solomon and charged him to build a house for the LORD, the God of Israel. ⁷David said to Solomon, "My son, I had planned to build a house to the name of the LORD my God. ⁸But the word of the LORD came to me, saying, 'You have shed much blood and have waged great wars; you shall not build a house to my name because you have shed so much blood in my sight on the earth. ⁹See, a son shall be born to you; he shall be a man of peace. I will give him peace from all his enemies on every side; for his name shall be Solomon, and I will give peace and quiet to Israel in his days. ¹⁰He shall build a house for my name. He shall be a son to me, and I will be a father to him, and I will establish his royal throne in Israel forever.' ¹¹Now, my son, the LORD be with you, so that you may succeed in building the house of the LORD your God, as [the LORD your God] has spoken concerning you. ¹²Only, may the LORD grant you discretion and understanding, so that when [the LORD] gives you charge over Israel you may keep the law of the LORD our God.

¹³Then you will prosper if you are careful to observe the statutes and the ordinances that the LORD commanded Moses for Israel. Be strong and of good courage. Do not be afraid or dismayed. ¹⁴With great pains I have provided for the house of the LORD one hundred talents of gold, one million talents of silver, and bronze and iron beyond weighing, for there is so much of it; timber and stone too I have provided. To these you must add more. ¹⁵You have an abundance of workers: stonecutters, masons, carpenters, and all kinds of artisans without number, skilled in working ¹⁶gold, silver, bronze, and iron. Now begin the work, and the LORD be with you."

Acts 9:36-43

9 ³⁶Now in Joppa there was a disciple whose name was Tabitha, which in Greek is Dorcas. She was devoted to good works and acts of charity. ³⁷At that time she became ill and died. When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. ³⁸Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, "Please come to us without delay." ³⁹So Peter got up and went with them; and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. ⁴⁰Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed. He turned to the body and said, "Tabitha, get up." Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. ⁴¹He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. ⁴²This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the Lord. ⁴³Meanwhile [Peter] stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.

God Calls God's People in Scripture

Mark 2:1-12

2 When [Jesus] returned to Capernaum after some days, it was reported that he was at home. ²So many gathered around that there was no longer room for them, not even in front of the door; and he was speaking the word to them. ³Then some people came, bringing to him a paralyzed man, carried by four of them. ⁴And when they could not bring him to Jesus because of the crowd, they removed the roof above him; and after having dug through it, they let down the mat on which the paralytic lay. ⁵When Jesus saw their faith, he said to the paralytic, "Son, your sins are forgiven." ⁶Now some of the scribes were sitting there, questioning in their hearts, ⁷"Why does this fellow speak in this way? It is blasphemy! Who can forgive sins but God alone?" ⁸At once Jesus perceived in his spirit that they were discussing these questions among themselves; and he said to them, "Why do you raise such questions in your hearts? ⁹Which is easier, to say to the paralytic, 'Your sins are forgiven,' or to say, 'Stand up and take your mat and walk'? ¹⁰But so that you may know that the Son of Man has authority on earth to forgive sins" – he said to the paralytic – ¹¹"I say to you, stand up, take your mat and go to your home." ¹²And he stood up, and immediately took the mat and went out before all of them; so that they were all amazed and glorified God, saying, "We have never seen anything like this!"

Acts 8:26-36

8 ²⁶Then an angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down rom Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.). ²⁷So [Philip] got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship ²⁸and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. ²⁹Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." ³⁰So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" ³¹[The Ethiopian eunuch] replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. ³²Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this:

"Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth. 33In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth."

³⁴The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" ³⁵Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to [the eunuch] the good news about Jesus. ³⁶As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?"

OPTIONAL Service of Healing Laying of Hands and Anointing

For the final Wednesday prior to the beginning of Holy Week, your context may find it meaningful to include a brief service of healing through the laying on of hands and anointing. If using this in worship, it could be used as a part of the prayer time, and then following this, the service would continue with the Lord's prayer.

Those who wish to receive the laying on of hands (and anointing of oil) may come forward to the altar rail kneeling if you so choose. While the laying on of hands occurs, quiet music may be played in the background, or hymns of the Lenten season or hymns of healing may be sung.

When being anointed, the pastoral leader may say:

L: Through this holy anointing may God's love and mercy uphold you by the grace and power of the Holy Spirit.

L: Let us pray. As you are anointed with this oil, may God bless you with the healing power of the Holy Spirit. May God forgive you your sins, release you from suffering, and restore to you wholeness and strength. May God deliver you from all evil, preserve you in all goodness, and bring you to everlasting life, through Jesus Christ our Lord.
