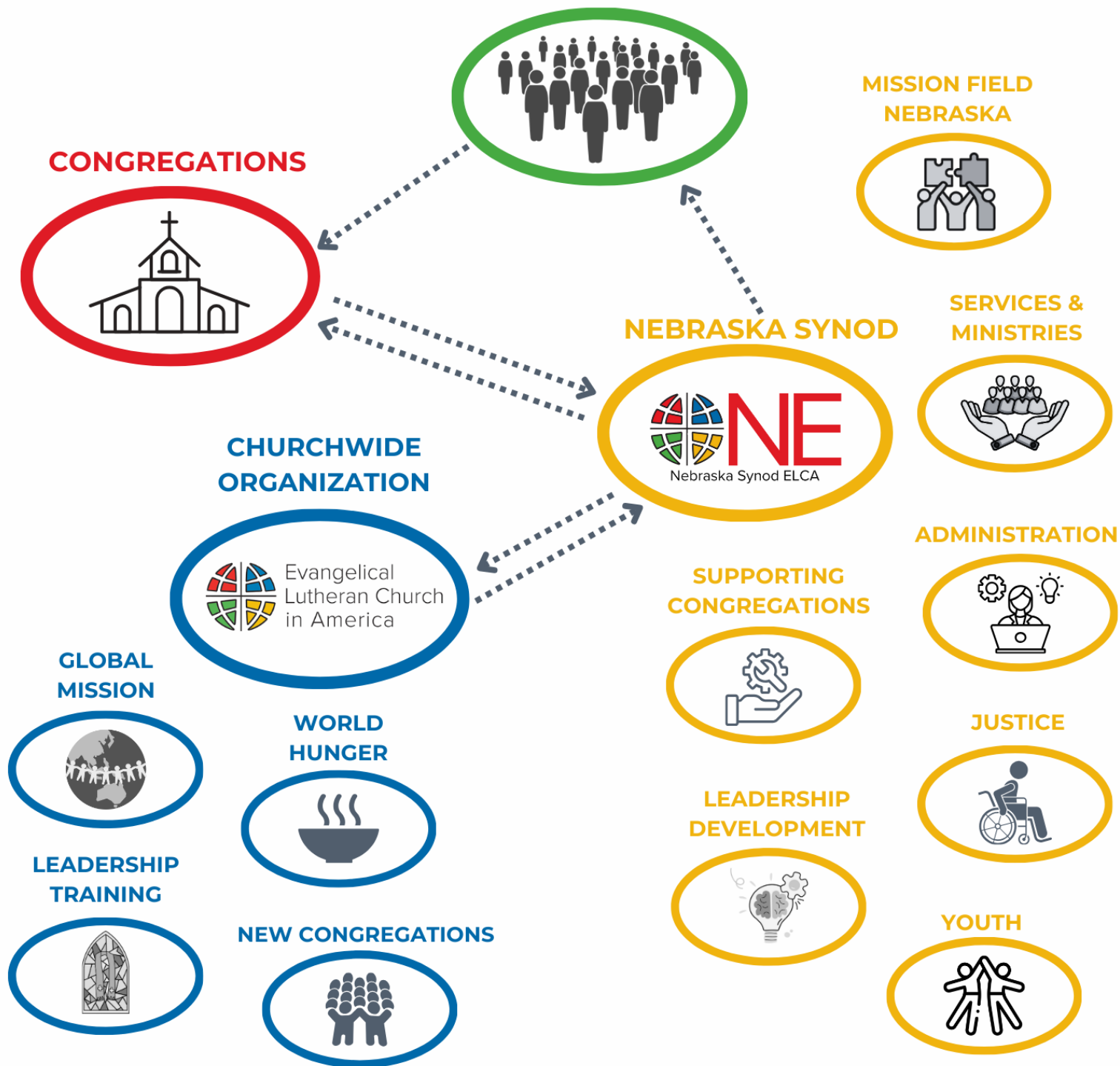


YOUR STEWARDSHIP IN ACTION THROUGH MISSION SHARE

Pastor Rob Corum says this about the ministry connecting expectations to faith: "AA says that expectations are premeditated resentments. But 'expectations' is another word for 'faith.' If we have faith in something that is going to let us down, it will kill us. But faith in God gives us life."

The Lakota Lutheran Center and Chapel in Scottsbluff is a Native-centered ministry that serves its community in many ways: providing Sunday worship, food and clothing, hot meals and showers. The Lakota Center is known regionally as a ministry which raises awareness and speaks with and for those who have no other voice. But more than all these things, what people will tell you is that Lakota is a place of welcome to people of all backgrounds, a place where everyone is accepted as they are, with Christlike love.

"Having my children be a part of these Wednesday classes brings them closer to God and their community," states a mother of three. Weekly, South Sudanese youth aged 3-12 gather in the dining room of Nile where multiple adult members of our congregation volunteer to spend time with youth. One teaches the Nuer language, another cooks and provides dinner, one volunteer teaches Nuer gospel songs, and Pastor Gok Badeng ends the night with a study from the bible. "I like learning new songs and seeing my new friends," says 8-year-old Nyapal Zakaria. It's been fantastic bringing the word of God to our youth as Nile continues to be a staple in the community.
